

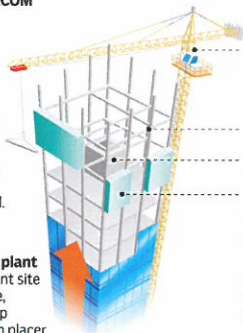
Cape Town's tallest skyscraper

The Portside office tower in Buitengracht Street will be the tallest and "greenest" building in Cape Town with a total height of 142 m. The last tall building to be completed in Cape Town, was the Safmarine Tower in 1993.

The height of Portside's spires reaches to 142 m in the sky. The top of the building is 129 m high. The roof is on the 34th level and 124 m high. A height restriction of buildings taller than 60 m in the city centre was dropped.

The tower is built from the **bottom to the top**. A single concrete core with pillars is constructed. Afterwards glass, water and electricity is installed and finally the interior like walls and ceilings are added.



A concrete batching plant was created on a vacant site opposite the main site, allowing them to pump concrete using a boom placer.

The glass would have been a light crystal colour, but it was changed to a darker azure.

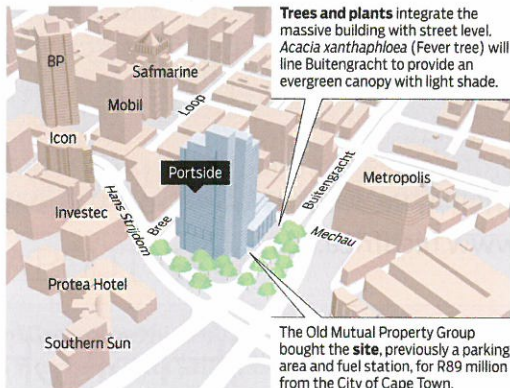

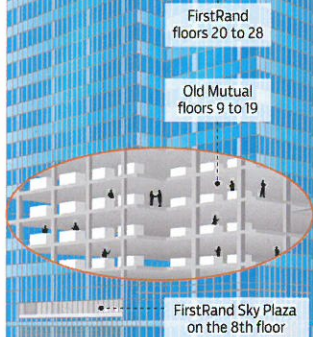
5 Star Green Design

Portside was awarded a five star "Design" rating under the Green Building Council of South Africa's Green Star rating system. This makes it the first 5 Star Green Star skyscraper in the country. Portside has focused on the environmental initiatives like energy reduction through an efficient air conditioning system; the storage and reuse of rainwater; the use of low embodied energy materials; and the maximization of natural light through a double glazed façade. One of the main distinguishing innovations includes the application of LED light fittings throughout the office space.



Trees and plants integrate the massive building with street level. *Acacia xanthophloea* (Fever tree) will line Buitengracht to provide an evergreen canopy with light shade.

The Old Mutual Property Group bought the site, previously a parking area and fuel station, for R89 million from the City of Cape Town.

The atriums on the eighth and ninth levels create natural terraces for business and public events.

The base is comprised of a parking podium with seven parking levels and 37 m high.

The inspiration for Portside's block and step profile was **Riverside South** and **Grand Central 2**, both in London. These are buildings with a step form to reduce the appearance of mass.

The lowest level is 14,25 m under the ground. The building occupies a whole city block with a surface area of 6 642 m².



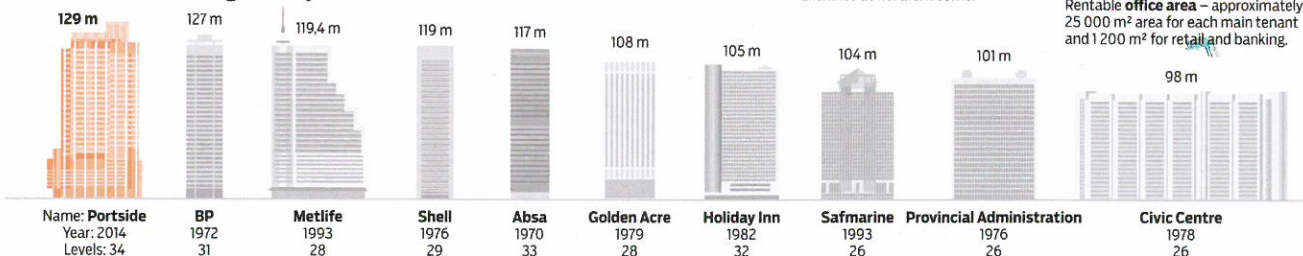

There are 1 466 parking bays in total on ten parking levels. Approximately 70 parking bays are for the use of hybrid or alternative fuel vehicles – 20% of these bays are provided and fitted with electric car charger points.

52 000 m²

Rentable office area – approximately 25 000 m² area for each main tenant and 1 200 m² for retail and banking.
